PROJECT UPDATE By Jackie Bremner, Project Director

Work to complete the detailed designs for the new Baird Family Hospital and the ANCHOR Centre is nearing completion with plans being put in place to submit the Full Business Case to the Board of NHS Grampian and Scottish Government for approval in June 2019. The main Construction works will commence thereafter in the summer following completion of the Enabling Works.

The Enabling Works started in November 2018. They include, for example, road realignment, water attenuation, service diversion and demolition works. The works will have a minimal effect on the delivery of clinical services on the Campus, but some services, particularly those close to the development sites, may be affected by noise and dust. Plans are in place with our colleagues at GRAHAM Construction to minimise the impact on clinical services during the works.

To celebrate the commencement of these works, two 'Turf Cutting' ceremonies were held on 18 December 2018. The weather was inclement, but it did not dampen the celebration at these important events which were hosted by the NHS Grampian Chairman, Professor Steven Logan, and attended by The Lord Provost, senior NHS



Grampian officers, staff, patient representatives, third sector partners, construction and design team colleagues, and elected members.

On Wednesday 31 October 2018, we launched the B&A Fundraising Campaign aimed at 'Delivering the Difference' in the new facilities for the benefit of patients, visitors and staff. Two very successful launch events were held: a public event at the Cafe Tempo in the Bon Accord Centre and an evening event hosted by Professor Logan at the Chester Hotel.

The fundraising for the Baird and ANCHOR developments will be led by our fundraising partners:

- The ARCHIE Foundation and Friends of the Neonatal Unit for The Baird Family Hospital
- Friends of ANCHOR for The ANCHOR Centre
- The University of Aberdeen Development Trust for Cancer research and Women's Health research at the University of Aberdeen, to support outstanding care at the new ANCHOR Centre and Baird Family Hospital

A fundraising group involving the three main charities, the Project Team and NHS Grampian Endowments is working to ensure a co-ordinated approach to all fundraising activities for these exciting projects over the next three years.

UPDATE ON THE ENABLING WORKS

The Enabling Works, or site preparation for the Baird and ANCHOR buildings, started on 19 November 2018. Good progress has been made over the last two months and visitors to the Foresterhill Health Campus will have noticed that work is happening on the ground. Hoarding has gone up around both building sites to separate them from the rest of the campus. Site accommodation for our construction teams is also in place. Weekly staff briefing sessions are taking place to ensure our NHS colleagues are aware of any construction activities that might impact on clinical and other services.

The Baird Family Hospital site preparation works so far have included the relocation of the helicopter landing lights and the wind sock; the construction of a haul road on site to allow various underground service diversion, excavation and drainage works to commence; and the realignment of the road adjacent to the Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital (RACH) patient car park. The demolition of the former Foresterhill Health Centre and Breast Screening Centre buildings is underway. Preparations are also being made for the temporary relocation of the RACH patient car park.

The existing RACH patient car park will close from mid-February until the end of April. During this period we encourage families to park in the Lady Helen Parking Centre (the multi-storey car park). A shuttle bus will operate between the Lady Helen Parking Centre and RACH. A temporary car park for the disabled and those with limited mobility will also be available close to RACH.

A section of Foresterhill Road at the Westburn Road junction will close completely to traffic for a period of around 8 weeks from the end of March 2019 (dates TBC). During this time, all vehicles



accessing the Foresterhill Health Campus will need to use alternative entrances. Work has also started on The ANCHOR Centre site. A new entrance to the Radiotherapy Centre is being constructed both externally and internally. The former Eye Outpatient Clinic building is being stripped of internal fittings in preparation for demolition. In the coming weeks, the road from Radiotherapy to the Matthew Hay Building will close as the ANCHOR site hoarding is brought up to connect to the existing Radiotherapy Centre building. This will allow for work to commence in earnest within the site.

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES
