Welcome to the August 2021 newsletter. As you will see from the photos later on in this issue, construction works on both developments are now well underway and are currently on schedule, despite continuing supply issues with specific materials affecting the whole of the UK. This issue is being kept under constant review with our Construction Partner, GRAHAM Construction.

In parallel with construction, the team continue to work hard to complete the internal design details. This is a considerable exercise which will continue throughout the next year.

The Project's virtual launch event went ahead on Tuesday 18 May 2021. It was very well received and was viewed by over 11,000 people via social media in its first month of being live. Baird and ANCHOR Site Progress

Here comes the technical bit..... We caught up with Graham Davidson our Technical Supervisor for an update on site progress, here is what he had to say...

The Baird Family Hospital site



On the Baird site large amounts of soil have been removed in order to create what will be the Lower Ground floor area of the building. This area will house a small



patient car park. There will also be a number of plant rooms in the lower ground floor.

Piling works have been completed on schedule and this is seen as a major milestone in the project. The ground workers are continuing to prepare the pile caps prior to forming the concrete columns, as well as undertaking the installation of drainage.

The next major piece of work on Baird sees the start of the concrete superstructure, this will result in a large number of concrete wagons arriving on site daily for the next year.

One thing that most people will notice is the change to the skyline with the arrival of three yellow tower cranes. A fourth tower crane will arrive shortly and this will be the tallest of all. The cranes are situated in such a manner that they will each serve one of the four zones (North, South, East and West of the building) and will remain in place until the superstructure has been completed.

The ANCHOR Centre has also seen rapid progress since work started on site in January. Piling works were completed in May, which allowed the pouring of the concrete floor slabs in the Lower Ground Floor, and the majority of below ground drainage has now been installed and tested.

August sees the concrete team complete their work and the start of the steelwork, another significant milestone for the building. ANCHOR is a slightly different construction from Baird in that the upper floors of the building are constructed using a steel frame. Once the steel beams start to be bolted together the outline of the building will rapidly take shape and I am sure this will be an exciting time for everyone.

Professor Sir Dugald Baird was a pioneer in the area of women's health. He was Regius Professor of Midwifery in Aberdeen from 1937 to 1965. During this time he transformed the obstetric services such that for a time Aberdeen had the best birth outcomes in the UK, and among the best in Europe.

Eighty years on from Professor Baird's pioneering work, the University took inspiration from his far-sighted and innovative programmes by establishing the Aberdeen Centre for Women's Health Research which was opened in March 2018 by Her Excellency Dr Sheikha Aisha Bint Faleh Al Thani.

Women's healthcare has changed dramatically in the past 50 years - but there are still significant risks to women's health and the health of their children, from fertility through pregnancy to childcare, motherhood and beyond. With the establishment of the Aberdeen Centre for



Women's Health Research, we are aiming to ensure that fewer women and their children are put at risk and to help people live healthier, happier and longer lives by vastly enhancing our research capability in the area of women's health.

The Baird Family Hospital will provide fantastic opportunities and facilities to help us advance this pioneering research. It will enable us to have a global research impact by attracting and retaining the very best academic and clinical staff, ultimately leading to excellent patient care in the area of women's health.
