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The Discharge to Assess Team

Discharge to Assess, also known as 'D2A', is a personcentred approach that supports the early discharge home of medically well patients after they have received their essential specialist care in hospital.

D2A service went live on 2nd August and the team have had a total of 24 patients, 17 of which have been discharged and two that have been referred on to the Community Rehab Team.

D2A ensure that people are assessed by the right person, at the right time and in the right environment. This means that patients are supported safely in their own homes and as a result avoid unnecessary re-admission to hospital.

D2A takes the time to get to know people, their motivations, their goals, and work alongside them providing them with the support to achieve those goals.

A qualified member of staff will complete an initial assessment and go on to identify patient's individual goals.

Health Care Support Workers will then support rehabilitation work with the patient, based on those goals with ongoing reviews by qualified staff to promote independence.

Patients have praised the service and said:

'I couldn't have done this without you...',

'It's so nice not to feel rushed...' and 'I couldn't have imagined being able to do this before you came in...'

Team lead's for D2A service, Karen Erskine and Claire McCallum said "We are so excited to have this service in place and seeing the positive effect it has on our patient's lives".

The Golden Ward Round

In August 2018, Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists (OTs), Nurses and Doctors working on the Acute Medical Assessment Unit (AMAU) realised an opportunity. As a team, we were seeing our patients at different times. There were multiple Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapist attendances daily to AMAU, duplication of assessment and multiple referrals were being made to the Hospital Discharge Team.

We decided we wanted to introduce a Consultant-led "Golden Ward Round" (GWR). This would enable the relevant professionals to jointly assess their



patient together. Immediately

we found this led to less duplication as everyone received the same information at the same time. Patient expectations were better managed through early focused decision making, and early safe discharge was planned by colleagues together.



In addition, we wanted to know whether the newly introduced Golden Ward Round led to changes in referral numbers, discharges and length of stay. We surveyed staff satisfaction where we looked at whether we could perform multi-disciplinary team patient assessment and whether the Golden Ward Roundimproved patient / team communication and patient experience.

The Golden Ward Round had great benefits to the patient and staff experience. Everyone knew of the detailed plan for each patient. There was a marked increase in same day Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapist discharges, and referrals to the Hospital Discharge Team were halved within 3 months. There was also a significant reduction in length of stay. Nursing staff felt their day was better managed and team communication was enhanced all round.

Dr Gray's welcomes recruitment success with four new Consultant General Surgeons


During 2021, Dr Gray's Hospital has welcomed four Consultant General Surgeons to join its dedicated staff on a permanent basis. These new colleagues are Mr Mohamed Bekheit, Ms Eimear Monaghan, Ms Laura Nicol & Mr Hadrian Oltean-Petria. They deliver day-to-day care on hospital wards, provide emergency care to the people of Moray and contribute to NHS Grampian's provision of speciality and planned care.

General Surgery at Dr Gray's has not always been easy to recruit to, so to have all consultant vacancies filled is a great achievement. This was helped by an innovative approach to attract candidates for the posts. Collaboration and support within NHS Grampian sites and with NHS Highland has allowed flexibility to encourage all appointees to develop speciality interests or access supportive mentoring. Advertising for the posts also highlighted Moray's unique potential for recreational activities and a good work/life balance.

The appointees were selected using a value-based interview process that matched their individual skills and values to those in the best interest of Dr Gray's Hospital and NHS Grampian. This is a new and modern approach aimed at establishing strong teams that foster development and commitment to the area they serve.

Upgrades to Radiology Services at Dr Gray's Hospital.

NHS Grampian has invested in state of the art software upgrades in the Radiology Department at Dr Gray's Hospital. These upgrades are guaranteed to help the ever-increasing demand on medical imaging and provide better patient care.



from the C-shaped arm attached to the machine that's used to take the images and can be used in operating theatres or within a clinic setting producing high-resolution X-ray images in "real time".

Additional features include two existing X-Ray rooms have new software installed to allow "stitching" of X-rays.

Stitching is combining multiple X-ray images to make a single high-resolution image. This requires nearly exact overlaps between images. The new software does this automatically and produces larger image results.

Mark Shannon, Radiology Manager at Dr Gray's said "software and equipment upgrades within radiology will ensure that we can continue to complete the high demands on medical imaging and do the best for our patients."

on a team member:



Lesley MacLeod Nurse Practitioner for Dr Gray's Hospital

My name is Lesley MacLeod and I'm the Lead Advanced Nurse Practitioner for Dr Gray's Hospital. My role within the hospital is to support the team of Advanced Nurse Practitioners (ANPs) across medicine and surgical wards and developing their clinical knowledge and skills.

In August, I undertook the Faculty Training for the Mobile Skills Unit. This course was delivered at Forth Valley Hospital on the Mobile Skills Unit, which is a large vehicle that is equipped with simulation technology. Training was varied, from venepuncture and cannulation to running large scale simulations, for example, the care of a deteriorating patient. The Faculty Training was not only about delivering the session, the training included planning the session, delivering, briefing and debriefing participants before and after the practical scenarios. It helped us to understand how to achieve the best teaching sessions, to set personal objectives of the participants as well as the objectives for the actual session.

The reason I completed this course was to ensure that I can successfully develop teaching and training sessions for all my colleagues here at Dr Grays. This is a great asset for maintaining and developing the skills and knowledge my team of Advanced Nurse Practitioners require for their role. Facilitating learning is one Pillar of Advanced Practice, so it is essential that myself and the team train in the art of delivering educational sessions to achieve this pillar of practice.

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
