Welcome to this latest edition of our public newsletter.

We have several exciting developments at Dr Gray's. The £1.5m refurbishment on Ward 7 is nearing completion; a new MRI scanner planned as part of National Treatment Centre programme and, the welcoming of two new consultants to our geriatrician team to help develop new pathways of care for the older population of Moray.

We have also welcomed the Cabinet Secretary recommendations and investment following the external maternity review process and are looking forward to working with our teams and the public to make good progress.

It has been an incredibly pressured few weeks at Dr Gray's with Norovirus and COVID-19 outbreaks having a significant impact on admitting capacity at our local hospital.

At times, there have been long delays for people being seen, treated and admitted or discharged from the Emergency Department. I know this can be difficult for patients. The increased pressures on our staff teams and Scottish Ambulance colleagues has also been felt but I'd like to express my sincere gratitude to the public and our patients for playing your part

By phoning NHS24 on 111 rather than attending at our Emergency Department and using other services including pharmacies and GP surgeries, means we can continue to treat the sickest people and those in need of urgent life-saving treatment here in Moray.

Advanced Nurse Practitioner's Celebration Day

Advanced Nurse Practitioner's (ANP's) have been working at Dr Gray's Hospital for a decade. During this time, there have been two very experienced team members in post within the Acute Medical Assessment Unit.

The team works across the hospital covering 7-day services. They are part of the clinical response team and trained in advanced life support.

In 2018, workforce planning along with support from the nurse consultant in advanced practice secured the recruitment of seven senior nurses to train in advanced practice at master's level with Robert Gordon University.

Three of the new team members have taken the next step to complete their master's degree with their dissertation projects being presented to the wider teams as learning opportunities but also as Quality Improvements for the service and for patients.

Lesley MacLeod the clinical lead for ANP's was appointed in 2019 to oversee and support the team

in their ongoing development as well as interim lead

for multi-professional education at Dr Gray's.

She said, "It is our hope that the team can expand further and develop more skills to support services across Dr Gray's and further improve patients experience".

"The team provide daily clinical support to the medical and surgical teams with their abilities to assess, examine, initiate treatment, prescribe medication and manage patient conditions on a day-to-day basis".

Dr Gray's MRI Scanner

The National Treatment Centre – Grampian (NTC-G) is one of ten centres across Scotland being developed to increase capacity and efficiency of elective services.

This will include the delivery of a new MRI facility at Dr Gray's Hospital in Elgin.

Radiology is a pivotal enabler that supports delivery of the highest standards of care, at all stages of referral, assessment, diagnosis, treatment and recovery.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) is a modern cross-sectional imaging technique that supports a range of planned-care diagnostic and management pathways.

NHS Grampian's recommendation to develop National Treatment Centre MRI facilities in Dr Gray's Hospital Elgin, recognises the importance of placing communities at the centre of what the health board does.

The investment in Dr Gray's Hospital, Elgin will support enhancement of the existing Radiology department and development and recruitment of existing and new team members.

At a wider level, this investment also represents improvement in the places where people live and tackles the issues that matter to them, with the expansion of specialist services available locally.

A purpose-built facility, designed to optimise both the patient experience and clinical service represents a vibrant opportunity in supporting population health.

The project is at a stage of confirming the final design around the facility, and the new additional workforce required to deliver this new service.

The new DGH MRI facility will be built adjacent and connected to the existing Radiology department.

It is planned that the business case in support of the new facility will be submitted to NHSG Board for review and approval in August

Following approval, a programme will be shared and communicated related to the construction and timescales to the new facility will follow.

Dr Gray's Hospital £1.5M ward refurbishment works update

Patients in Moray will receive a welcome boost after it was announced they will be able start to reap the benefits of a £1.5 million upgrade at the region's flagship hospital.

NHS Grampian have confirmed that the work to refurbish the main ward for acute care of the elderly at Dr Gray's Hospital is near completion.

Alasdair Pattinson, general manager for Dr Gray's said, staff cannot wait to get started seeing patients at the revamped facility.

He said: "Ward 7, formerly known as the main General Medicine & ACE Unit, is celebrating its 40th year of operation this year and we are delighted that it is now able to boast a host of plush new features.

"The work saw the interior of the 24-bed area gutted and completely rebuilt from the ground up into a fresh, light, airy and welcoming space for patients."

Some of the changes include new relative and staff rooms, nurse bases, shower rooms, furnishings, televisions, lighting, windows, a raft of structural changes and new flooring as well as new patient activity space.

Alasdair added "It's been a sizable investment and no easy task, but it is one that should help ensure that ward 7 remains the heart of acute elderly care in Moray for many years to come".

Lisa Duthie, NHS Grampian endowment fund lead said: "As the official health charity of NHS Grampian, we are delighted to have funded £455,000 towards the enhancements of the existing bed bays, bath and shower facilities and general decor.

"A key element was to create an activities room to enable patients to eat meals, socialise and relax when away from their bedside.

"I would like to express our heartfelt thanks to the local community for their generous donations towards the project.

"One of our core aims is to transform clinical spaces into welcoming and relaxing environments to help improve the patient's hospital experience and to also benefit NHS staff wellbeing."

Shockwave

Treatment of common conditions like tennis elbow or pain in the thigh, hip, knee, and shoulder is now available in Moray. Shockwave therapy offers both pain relief and restores mobility, without requiring surgery, but up until recently, patients could only receive this treatment in Aberdeen.

New equipment, costing £23,000, has been installed at Dr Gray's Hospital and it is hoped weekly clinics will begin in mid-June.

The shockwave technology delivers soundwaves to the affected area, helping it to heal as well as reducing discomfort. Properly known as chronic or persistent tendinopathies, conditions like tennis elbow affect a large number of people, impacting on their ability to work and lead a normal life.

Mr Toni Papadopoulos (Consultant in Orthopaedics) said:

"We are pleased to announce the beginning of a service which was missing from our local population. We are trying our best to improve the treatment of musculoskeletal problems, as close to home as possible".

Proud to care

Front line care workers in Moray, as well as the people they care for, have come together to urge more people to join the social care workforce.

4,000 hours of care are delivered by the service each week and demand continues to grow. 19 new Social Care Assistants were welcomed to the council team between January and April this year

and more are currently going through the recruitment and induction programme.

Mobile Skills Unit

In April this year, The Moray Practice Education Team were delighted to host the Mobile Skills Unit at Dr Gray's Hospital. This was a two-week education event in partnership with the Clinical Skills Managed Education Network (CSMEN).

The mobile unit provides a safe learning environment with state of the art simulation equipment.

NHS Grampian staff across Moray were able to access local training and for many it had been the first time since the start of the pandemic that they were able to attend face-to-face training.

Organisation of the training programme and facilitation of the learning was a valuable team building exercise encouraging staff groups to come together to share their diverse knowledge and skills.

The main training focused on patient centred care and staff development.

This included recognition and management of deteriorating patients, advanced clinical skills, clinical scenarios for junior doctors, trauma education for emergency department and access to various other clinical skills workshops.

Following on from the success of this event the Mobile Skills Unit will be back on the Dr Gray's site in September 2022. A big thank you to everyone involved.
